51	Rob Clemens thanked Bill Widmer and Kristan Patenaude for their help organizing			
52	Town-Wide Clean Up Day. The event seemed to be successful, even with the limitations			
53	of COVID-19.

55	2. Minutes (7/29)			
56	The Commission agreed to table review of the minutes to its next meeting.			
57				
58	3. Treasurer's Report

61	of the pending charges have now been filed with the Town. The Land Account balance is			
62	\$227,202.69, and the Gift Account balance is \$13,606. He explained that the ACC's portion of			
63	the Gleason easement settlement has been sent to the Town for processing. The bill for Maridian's work will be sent for normant out of the Conservation Fund			
64 65	Meridian's work will be sent for payment out of the Conservation Fund.			
66	In response to a question from Rob Clemens, Bill Widmer stated that the Gift Account currently			
67	has about \$13,000. This is after the expenditure of about \$3,375 for the Buck Meadow kiosk.			
68	has about \$15,000. This is after the experientate of about \$5,575 for the Duck Meadow Mosk.			
69	In response to a question from Rob Clemens, Kristan Patenaude stated that she believes a LUCT			
70	payment of about \$13,000 was recently approved by the Board of Selectmen.			
71				
72	Bill Widmer explained that the Town's budget cycle for the next fiscal year will begin soon. The			
73	cycle starts on September 4, 2020, with a first draft of the budget being discussed by the Board			
74	of Selectmen on September 14, 2020. He suggested that the ACC get together their budget ideas			
75	before the August 22, 2020 meeting in order to be prepared. Rob Clemens agreed to discuss this			
76	with Bill Widmer and Jared Hardner, and asked that Commissioners send their budget proposals			
77	along before the next meeting.			
78				
79	Frank Montesanto moved to accept the Treasurer's Report as presented. Jared			
80	Hardner seconded.			
81	Roll call vote: Vick Bennison – aye; Rob Clemens – aye; Lee Gilman – aye; Jared			
82	Hardner – aye; John Harvey – aye; Rich Hart – aye; Frank Montesanto – aye.			
83	Motion carried unanimously.			

4. Planning and Permitting

Bill Stoughton, representative from the ACC to the Planning Board, explained that the Planning Board recently heard and approved the application for an accessory dwelling unit on Stearns

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- 88 Road, located in a wetland buffer. The Board had concerns regarding the number of bedrooms
- and size of the septic system on the property. The Board decided to make the approval
- 90 conditional on a note being added to the drawing that if the owner were to increase the number of
- bedrooms being used to more than four, there will be a review and approval of an updated septic
- 92 system.
- 93
- 94 Bill Stoughton explained that the Board also heard the Pine Road self-storage facility
- 95 application. The proposed storage units are adjacent to the wetland buffer, with infiltrated areas
- ⁹⁶ in the buffer itself. The Board continued this hearing to its September 16, 2020, meeting.

98 **<u>TOPICS</u>**:

99 5. Forestry Update – Mike Gagnon, Hillsborough County Forester

100 Mike Gagnon stated that he started in this position in December 2019. He has been completing

- 101 site visits with land owners and workshop series, following very strict protocol due to COVID-
- 102 19. There will soon be a Timber Harvest Seminar for Municipalities that the ACC might be
- 103 interested in. He is hoping to organize tree walks in local towns to help improve the resource
- 104 base for municipalities and landowners.
- 105
- 106 Bill Widmer explained that the ACC discussed pocket openings in the Town's mature forests
- about a year ago; he asked for guidance on this issue. Mike Gagnon stated that there is actually
- 108 value to mature forests in this part of the state. However, there is also timber revenue that can be
- accumulated from cuts. Mike Gagnon stated that he would be happy to walk properties with
- 110 ACC members and Charlie Koch. While Charlie Koch deals more with the consulting forester
- 111 items at hand, Mike Gagnon explained that he deals with the education and advisory aspects of
- 112 this issue.
- 113

114 Jared Hardner explained that Charlie Koch is completing the final inventories on areas in Joppa

- 115 Hill for the Forest Management Plan. He would like there to be an evaluation of the regenerated
- 116 cut areas before the Plan is finalized. He is not satisfied that the patch cuts are doing what was
- 117 hoped for. The primary goal for these cuts was to promote a diversity of wildlife habitats in the
- 118 forests. In reviewing one year's worth of camera trap data for these areas, he is mostly still
- seeing deer browsing on oak trees. He saw one bear, one coyote, and one fox each on one day
- 120 out of 365. He suggested the ACC wait a few years to see what will happen in these areas.
- 121
- 122 Mike Gagnon agreed with Jared Hardner's idea of waiting for now on these areas. He explained
- 123 that there's also no biomass market currently.
- 124
- 125 In response to a question from Rob Clemens, Jared Hardner stated that the deadline for the
- 126 completion of the Forest Plan is about three months from now. However, he believes it's more
- 127 important to get the plan right before putting prescriptions in place. He explained that Matt Tarr
- 128 has deemphasized the benefit of some of the management interventions we have been
- 129 considering, in favor of managing for unfragmented forest. He believes the ACC should leave
- 130 the large contiguous chunks alone for now.

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- 132 Mike Gagnon explained that there is value to Amherst's intact forests, as these are becoming
- 133 scarce in southern New Hampshire. Contiguous forest landscapes should not be taken lightly and
- 134 chopped up.
- 135
- 136Rob Clemens noted that there were LUCT funds earmarked for the planning of the Forest
- Management Plan, and that the ACC has an obligation to the Board of Selectman and Town toreport out information.
- 139
- 140 Jared Hardner explained that there is currently a database of forest stands in GIS that can have
- 141 analyses run on it. He does not recommend prescribing cuts now, as he is not confident in the
- 142 outcomes.
- 143
- 144 Rob Clemens suggested that the group set up a site walk with Mike Gagnon.
- 145
- 146 Mike Gagnon explained that landowner's often don't know that the UNH Extension is a resource 147 for consulting forest or arborist information.
- 147 fc 148
- 149 Lee Gilman stated that one of the ACC's largest management efforts is on the Bragdon property.
- 150 He stated that the area is currently invaded by at least eight different invasive species. He would
- 151 like to look at the quality of the native species there. Jared Hardner also suggested expanding the
- roughed up edge of the property and cutting back the perimeter of the upper field.
- 153
- 154 Rob Clemens mentioned that, through the current proposal for the Farmhouse Marketplace
- application, 25 acres of a conservation easement may soon extend the forest footprint at
- 156 Bragdon.
- 157

158 **6. Stormwater Ordinance Review**

- Rob Clemens explained that the ACC has responsibilities under the Town ordinances regardingstormwater regulations.
- 161
- 162 Bill Stoughton stated that the State and Town have responsibilities for managing stormwater.
- 163 The Town's responsibilities include stormwater involving small projects in Town, providing
- additional protection to sensitive areas, and integrating stormwater controls with development
- 165 planning. The current Town stormwater regulations were last revised in 2007. He suggested that
- 166 the ACC review the water resource protections and the disconnects between the State and Town
- 167 requirements. The MS4 permit requires the regulations to be reviewed and/or revised. This
- 168 review was due in July 2020.
- 169
- 170 Bill Stoughton reviewed some of the State/Town disconnects. Amherst's regulations currently
- 171 look at the size of stormwater facilities for small events based on the 25 year storm, versus the
- 172 State using a basis of the 50 year storm. The precipitation tables in Amherst's regulations are
- 173 from the 1940's, whereas the State's tables contain more current data.
- 174

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175 Bill Stoughton explained that the Town's regulations currently fall short in a number of areas,

including: the disconnects with the State regulations; not addressing treatment standards for

sediments, nitrogen, and phosphorous; not requiring the setback of stormwater facilities from

- waste supply sources; not integrating low impact development provisions; and limited
- 179 requirements for groundwater recharge.
- 180

181 Bill Stoughton stated that he reviewed the 2019 Manchester and Nashua Regional Stormwater

182 Coalition draft regulations. Former Community Development Director, Gordon Leedy, was

183 involved with this group. He explained that the Town could use the DES Alteration of Terrain

184 (AoT) framework but apply it to areas important to the Town. These draft documents should be

- reviewed with the Community Development Office and DPW. The ACC could then have a
- 186 discussion on these and decide on any revisions. This would then need to be considered and
- 187 voted on by the Planning Board and Board of Health (Board of Selectmen, and Scott Tenney).188
- 189 Jared Hardner suggested that the group get a feeling for what types of mitigation is possible and
- 190 which types are practical. He used the recent road construction along Christian Hill Road as an
- 191 example. He explained that the area now pours stormwater into the surface water on
- 192 conservation lands. There is no infrastructure in place to manage the stormwater on the roads.
- 193

194 Bill Stoughton explained that the State regulations have a section for dealing with the best

- 195 management practices of stormwater mitigation, such as detention, infiltration, and treatment
- 196 methods. He explained that the current regulations could be altered to include language regarding
- 197 infiltration methods.
- 198
- 199 In response to a question from John Harvey, Bill Stoughton explained that, because a new

200 ordinance is not being proposed, this would not need to go to Town Meeting, but would need

- 201 approval from the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen. He does believe that this item needs
- to be handed off in order to be further pursued.
- 203

Rob Clemens explained that the Community Development Office is responsible for a lot of this,
but could probably use some help. Eric Hahn, DPW Director, has noted that private landowners

- 206 often have no knowledge of stormwater issues, erosion, and the effects on wetlands. There seems
- to be a possible area for educational outreach that the ACC might be able to help with.
- 208
- 209 Rich Hart suggested that some ways to control the runoff from storms might be to increase the
- 210 volume of water in wetlands, or ask developers/landowners to create vernal pools to trap the
- 211 water for a bit.
- 212
- 213 Bill Stoughton noted that the draft regulations require that the volume of water leaving the site
- 214 post-development not exceed the flow pre-development, per the 50 year storm.
- 215
- 216 Rob Clemens stated that the ACC will need to discuss the aquifer protection ordinance
- 217 requirements at its next meeting, in regards to the Amherst Subaru project proposal. Due to the
- 218 location of the proposed project, the applicant will need to comply with the Town's aquifer

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219 220	protect comple	tion requirements. The project will probably need to follow the State's guidelines to be in iance.
221	1	
222	7.	Grasslands Mowing Schedule
223		John Harvey reviewed the ACC's mowing schedule and costs. In August 2020, the
224		grasslands suggested to be mowed, and the estimated costs to mow them at \$75/hour are:
225		Joppa Hill North (\$450), Currier (\$375), Grater Woods (\$300), Ackley (\$375), Sky
226		Meadow South (\$390), Woolsey Landing (\$190), and the Boutelle Landing (\$225). He
220		noted that the Ackley property has been mowed by an abutter in the past, but will now be
228		moved by the ACC. Also, the DPW was agreed to mow that rear area of Forestview
229		Cemetery.
230		centetery.
230		John Harvey moved to exercise a contract with Mike Riccitelli for bush hog mowing
231		in the amount of \$2,200 to come from the Conservation Fund. Vick Bennison
232		seconded.
233 234		seconded.
234		Discussion:
235		Bill Widmer stated that he believes, per the Town Purchasing Policy, that
		competitive bids need to be sought for this work. If a competitive bid is based on
237		• • •
238 239		price, there shouldn't be any surprises along the way.
239		John Harvey stated that Mike Riccitelli's contract is with the ACC, not with the
240		Town. The agreement needs to be updated and signed, but was previously for
241		\$65/hour for mowing services. This rate has not changed in the past four years.
242		\$05/nour for mowing services. This rate has not changed in the past four years.
243		In response to a question from Bill Widmer, John Harvey stated that, in the past,
244		the contract was signed by the ACC and filed with the Town Administrator.
245 246		the contract was signed by the ACC and med with the Town Administrator.
247		Bill Stoughton noted that the ACC is a Town entity, and should follow the
248		Purchasing Policy.
249		i urenusnig i oney.
250		John Harvey noted that the mowing contract is considered habitat management,
251		and is thus funded from the LUCT Fund, not from the Town budget. He believes the
252		Town Purchasing Policy only effects the Town budget. The policy is thus a guideline
253		that this contract is not beholden to.
254		
255		Bill Stoughton mentioned that LUCT funds are still the people's moneys.
256		
257		Rob Clemens agreed that, as a Town entity, the ACC should follow the Town's
258		Purchasing Policy. He also believes that the negotiated rate of \$65/hour seems
259		reasonable. He questioned if going out to bid made sense for completing smaller
260		mowing projects around Town.
261		0 F
262		Mike Cohen suggested that Mike Riccitelli should have a fixed contract with a clear
263		scope.

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264		
265		Rob Clemens suggested that next year the ACC take some advance time to look at
266		the options for mowing.
267		
268		John Harvey amended his motion: to exercise a contract with Mike Riccitelli for
269		bush hog mowing, at the following properties: Joppa Hill North, Currier, Grater
270		Woods, Ackley, Sky Meadow South, Woolsey, and Boutelle Landings, in the amount
271		of \$2,200 to come from the Conservation Fund, to be completed in 2020. Vick
272		Bennison seconded.
273		Roll call vote: Vick Bennison – aye; Rob Clemens – aye; Lee Gilman – aye; Jared
274		Hardner – aye; John Harvey – aye; Rich Hart – aye; Frank Montesanto – aye.
275		Motion carried unanimously.

277	8.	Trail Signage Requirements
278		Vick Bennison explained that he is working to bring trail signage up to a standard. Then
279		there will be no real signage needs, unless a new trail/property is acquired. He questioned
280		if the ACC prefers metal or PVC signs. He prefers metal signs, as they seem to be longer-
281		lasting. He stated that the cost of a PVC sign is about \$5-10, whereas a metal sign is
282		about \$25.
283		
284		Jared Hardner stated that he would prefer to stick to the standard and work on negotiating
285		with the sign company.
286		
287		Vick Bennison moved to expend an amount not to exceed \$130, to purchase five
288		metals signs for Pond Parish and Converse Woods.
289		0
290		Vick Bennison amended his motion: to expend up to \$530 for metal and PVC signs
291		on the trails from the Signage line. Jared Hardner seconded.
292		
293		Discussion:
294		Bill Stoughton stated that Vick Bennison does an amazing job on trail signage. He
295		also wants to make sure the ACC doesn't overspend the funds in the budget for
296		signage.
297		Roll call vote: Vick Bennison – aye; Rob Clemens – aye; Lee Gilman – aye; Jared
298		Hardner – aye; John Harvey – aye; Rich Hart – aye; Frank Montesanto – aye.
299		Motion carried unanimously.
300		·
301	9.	Drop Box Account
302		Jared Hardner explained that he has looked into various other services similar to Drop
303		Box for the ACC's use. He explained that for \$204/year, the ACC can sign up for a
304		Family Account on Drop Box. This will allow six ACC members full access to all of the
305		documents. The other members can use free accounts to access individual folders.
306		
307		In response to a question from Mike Cohen, Jared Hardner stated that the six people can
308		be changed at any point without penalty.

309	Jared Hardner moved for the ACC to establish a Family Account on Drop Box at
310	the expense of \$204/year, for a one year period, to be taken out of the Dues and
311	Subscriptions line. Frank Montesanto seconded.
312	Roll call vote: Vick Bennison – aye; Rob Clemens – aye; Lee Gilman – aye; Jared
313	Hardner – aye; John Harvey – aye; Rich Hart – aye; Frank Montesanto – aye.
314	Motion carried unanimously.
315	
316	Jared Hardner noted that he would be the executor of the account. Bill Stoughton suggested that
317	the Commissioners let Jared Hardner know which folders they will need access to.
318	
319	10. Other Business
320	Bill Stoughton stated that he needs help monitoring an area near Joppa Hill and the Flume. This
321	area has more perimeter than any of the other properties. Rob Clemens suggested that some
322	members of the public might volunteer to help with this task as well.
323	
324	Jared Hardner noted that he purchased face masks with the ACC logo on it for the group.
325	
326	In response to a question from Frank Montesanto, Lee Gilman stated that the company doing the
327	road construction on Christian Hill Road should clear the silt from the silt fence before removing
328	it. If they don't and the sediment leaves the site, the project could be in violation.
329	
330	Bill Widmer discussed a phosphite fertilizer treatment for an ash tree at PMEC. Lee Gilman
331	stated that he has some of this treatment that he could sell to the ACC.
332	
333	Bill Widmer moved to expend an amount, not to exceed \$200, from the Invasives
334	Mitigation line, to procure phosphite treatment for an ash tree at Joe English. Vick
335	Bennison seconded.
336	Roll call vote: Vick Bennison – aye; Rob Clemens – aye; Lee Gilman – aye; Jared
337	Hardner – aye; John Harvey – aye; Rich Hart – aye; Frank Montesanto – aye.
338	Motion carried unanimously.
339	
340	Bill Widmer noted that Clean Up Day went well. He thanked Kristan Patenaude for her help. He
341	believes about 2/3 the total number of bags from previous years were collected. The group
342	discussed certain areas in Town that still needed to be cleaned. The ACC agreed to try to
343	schedule Clean Up Day around Earth Day in 2021.
344	
345	John Harvey mentioned that the NHACC/DES Conservation Class will be attended by four ACC
346	members. Vick Bennison agreed to go in place of Kristan Patenaude.
347	
348	John Harvey noted that the grasslands at Buck Meadow are probably about 10-12 acres. He
349	explained that birds usually need grasslands of much more than 10 acres to be beneficial. The
350	grasslands currently in Buck Meadow are thin and innutricious. He explained that the options are
351	to do nothing to the grasslands and see what happens within 2-3 years, or plant a conservation

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352 353	mix in the area, including drought-resistant grass, and allow the grasslands to take off by the second year.
354	
355	Rob Clemens stated that the ACC will address this issue at its August 26, 2020, meeting.
356	
357 358	John Harvey stated that trails are not the only things in Town that deserve signage. He proposed placing signs at locations, such as: O'Dell Preserve and Great Meadow. These signs would be
359	seen as people drive by and mark the locations more easily.
360	
361 362	Jared Hardner explained that Frank Montesanto put in a kiosk at the Great Meadow that has yet to be populated with any information.
363	
364 365	Mike Cohen stated that he and Kristan Patenaude are working on some signage for Buck Meadow.
366	Meddow.
367	Rich Hart stated that the apples in Lindabury Orchard look good but aren't plentiful. He
368	explained that the hayfield there has not yet been mowed and that the lower meadow has a lot of
369	poison ivy. Rob Clemens asked Rich Hart to discuss these items with Friends of the Orchard
370	(FOTO).
371	
372	Vick Bennison noted that he would be adding some kiosk maps into Drop Box.
373	
374 375	Rob Clemens stated that the group will meet again on August 26 th to discuss the Amherst Subaru proposal, the deer stand policy, and the Buck Meadow grasslands issue.
376	
377	Vick Bennison moved to adjourn the meeting at 9:43pm. Jared Hardner seconded.
378	Motion carried unanimously.
