Amherst Elderly/Blind/Disabled Exemptions and

Tax Credits Information

Elderly and disabled or blind Amherst residents may apply for an exemption for the property taxes on their primary residence, providing that they meet all State requirements and the Town's income and asset criteria. Veteran's tax credits are also available.

The Town has prepared this handy chart to assist residents in determining their eligibility for applying for the various tax credits and tax exemptions available.

Board of Selectmen Meeting Highlights

December 4:

- Marion Kastner was appointed to a 3 yr term on the Souhegan River Local Advisory Committee
- Representatives from the Souhegan Cooperative School District requested the use of impact fees for a project at the high school; the BOS will confer with Town Counsel on the appropriate application of these funds
- Tracie Adams presented the action plan of the Village Streets Study Committee; the BOS voted to authorize the DW director to move forward with the design engineering and grant application as recommended by the committee's action plan
- FY25 Operating Budget -Draft 2, with warrant articles, was presented with considerable discussion
- An addendum to the Mutual Aid and Assistance Agreement (Building Inspector) with the Town of Hollis was approved
- Continuing efforts to Quiet Title in the property at 7 Thorntons Ferry Road 1 were approved
- Discussion was held on the recent NRPC Traffic Survey on BPR; possible No Thru Trucking ordinance was discussed
- A donation of land from town residents, and a separate sale of land were discussed and referred to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission and Heritage Commission for their review and comment

December 11:

- The BOS held a public hearing to accept block grant monies from the DOT in the amount of \$94,204.42.
- The ACC proposed a Bond be included as a Warrant Article on the March ballot for \$10M for open space acquisition. The Board felt that this may not be the proper year to place on the ballot.
- The Bicycle/Pedestrian Committee returned to the BOS with more information about a state grant that has been awarded to Amherst for a portion of a rail trail from Birch Park to Walnut Hill Road in the amount of \$1.68M over the course of 4 years. It would require a Town match of \$336,000 and they have secured a Bean Foundation grant of \$70,000 and are working on other grant opportunities and donations. The BOS overall was in favor of the project but made the decision to ask the voters if they are willing to commit to the cost of this project through a referendum on the March ballot.
- FY25 Operating Budget Draft #3 was presented; discussion was held on joining the NH Retirement System, offering an increased 457b town contribution and changes to the health insurance policies.

December 18:

- The BOS appointed 3 property owners to the Baboosic Lake Community Septic Committee: Michael Cullen, Bruce Bowler and Leslie Brenker
- The Energy Committee presented their recommendation to the BOS to move forward with Standard Power and a community power plan for Amherst; the proposal will be a Warrant Article on the March ballot and requires town approval
- A No Thru Trucking Ordinance was discussed for BPR through the village; referred to the Highway & Safety Committee
- FY25 Operating Budget Draft #4 was discussed with changes made at the most recent BOS meeting; 2024 Warrant article Draft #1 presented
- The BOS approved an updated Town Purchasing Policy
- Robert Soares hiring was approved, Communications Specialist; and the re-hiring of Carl Weichert as a Call Firefighter was also approved

December 29:

- An additional meeting of the BOS was noticed for the purpose of reviewing the FY25 Operating Budget Draft #5 with FY25 Revenue estimates; and FY25 Default Budget
- Proposed Warrant Articles were also reviewed
- A Public Hearing will be held on January 8, 2024, on these FY25 Budget and Warrant Articles (see below).

Food Composting Year-End

The food composting program at the Transfer station has completed it's first year (11 full months) and it's been wonderfully successful!

December totals are: <u>2600 lbs</u> of food scraps being diverted from the landfill.

For the year ending 12/21/2023, **25,570 lbs** of food waste was used for composting and not transported away as trash. The momentum is here and 2024 will garner even better results.
