

Board of Selectmen Meeting Highlights

May 8:

- A public hearing was held to receive input on the purchase of the parcels of land to be used for conservation land/open space
- The town Highway Safety Committee reported on residents' concerns about truck traffic, speeding and noise on Boston Post Road; several suggestions were discussed, and the Town will follow up on some identified issues
- The Board approved the use of the Town Common on June 3 for a college student film project titled "Street Piano"
- Results of the Protest Petitions submitted prior to the Town Meeting were presented and accepted by the BOS
- The Board approved partnering with SNHU which will offer a discount to town employees and their family members who enroll in courses.
- Discussion and review of the Town's employee Sick Leave policy
- Approval was given to award the Police Department's body worn camera contract
- Discussion re: the Fire/EMS Department retention of the 3rd ambulance; approval to retain was granted and BOS will review in 1 year
- Approval was given for the Recreation Director to apply for a Land Water Conservation Grant; if awarded, proceeds will be used to assist in building athletic fields and a pickleball court at Buckmeadow Park
- Approval was granted for the DPW to replace its work order management software; awarded to Brightly Software
- Finance Dir. Deb Bender reported on the current budget to actual; the budget is currently in good shape with approximately 16% available (as of April)
- Opportunities Network was granted approval for use of the Town Common for a 5K race on September 30
- Approval was granted for the use of the Town Common by the Congregational Church for the Annual Frederik Douglass Statewide Reading on July 1

May 15:

- The Board approved the purchase of the Curran property land (3 parcels) and the financing of the Bond
- Mobycon presented the results of the Village Streets Study (if you missed it, a video recording can be found here: <u>https://vimeo.com/827389454</u>)

May 22:

- The Board discussed and agreed to update the Town's Unassigned Fund Balance Policy
- The BOS discussed the next steps regarding the Village Streets Study; the Board agreed to form a committee to review all ideas and make recommendations. Citizen members will be invited to submit a letter of interest to join the committee. More details to follow.
- The Fourth of July Committee was given approval for use of the Town Common for July 4 from 6 AM to 2 PM

Community Corner

The Souhegan Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is a group of citizens who are trained to respond 24 hours a day to any of four local towns. They are available to Police and Fire Departments for traffic scene control, search and rescue, mass casualty events or other emergencies where additional personnel are needed. Examples include Halloween in the Village and the 4th of July parade and fireworks.

When not waiting for emergencies, they teach emergency preparedness, build resilience and prepare our towns for catastrophic disasters. They also conduct presentations on Long Term Electrical Outages, ransomware attacks, generator safety and "You are the Help until Help arrives".
