Board of Selectmen Meeting Highlights

October 10:

- Tracie Adams, Chair of the Village streets study Committee, updated the BOS as the the committee's work
- Mercedes Olster, Chair if the Energy Committee, presented the BOS with a recommendation; the BOS voted to continue with the steps necessary to establish community power in Amherst and to work with Standard Power in these efforts
- The Conservation Commission, Office of Community Development and DPW presented their Strategic Plans
- The BOS approved the award for Town Meeting Hall Room A/V project to Unique Scientific in the amount of \$11,940
- A pavement bid award for the Honey Brook Lane project was awarded to Theriault & Sons in the amount of \$9440
- Laura Kimball was hired as the new Recreation Supervisor for Amherst Recreation

October 23:

- The BOS has begun the discussion of wage and benefits for employees including the annual COLA
- A representative from the NH Retirement System attended to provide an overview of the program
- The Capital Improvements Plan presentation was reviewed and accepted
- A bid for town building cleaning was approved (Jay McKenna Cleaning)
- A bid for the exterior painting of Buck Meadow Clubhouse to 603 Painting LLC was approved
- A DPW pilot program to award a plowing contract to Knott's Landcare in the amount of \$27,500 was approved
- A revision to the Baboosic Lake Community Septic committee charter was approved

Amherst ... Past and Present

You can't miss the large antique clock that stands guard over the Barbara Landry Meeting Room at Town Hall. Everyone recognizes its regular and distinctive ring on the hour when attending meetings or other events.

Where did it come from? Who is Perkins Nichols, Esq.? How old is it?

The clock is inscribed with the words "A Gift from Perkins Nichols, Esq." According to Secomb's History of the Town of Amherst (1883), this "elegant clock" was presented to the town on September 9, 1805, and "placed in the meeting-house directly in front of the desk." The meetinghouse was remodeled in 1837 and the clock was moved to the town hall, under the church. It remained there until the "courtroom was fitted up for a town-hall" when it was removed to the place it now occupies.



Perkins Nichols, Esq. was born in Amherst in 1773, the son of General Moses Nichols. He moved later to Boston and died in 1855. His father, Moses (1740-1790), held positions of importance in Amherst as a physician, selectman, representative and the Hillsborough Co. register of deeds until his death. He is buried in the Old Burying Ground next to the Town Hall.



The clock must be wound regularly by hand and that duty currently is held by Town Administrator Dean Shankle. But every once in a while, someone else has the honor.

Board of Selectmen Chairman Peter Lyon winds and resets the hands on the clock.




Amherst Community Power Survey
