I. Call to Order

Chairman Will Ludt called the meeting to order sharply at 10:30 PM.

Topics of Discussion – On-site Visit and Discussions of Amherst Quarries

The meeting started with introductions of people in attendance and with our guest lectures, James and Mary Gage of StoneStructures.org. Chairman Ludt stated that the purpose of the tour was twofold: the Patch Hill Quarry tour was to learn and be educated on information about a unique "Hidden Treasure" of Amherst- its quarrying industry of the late 19th and early 20th century; and to initiate the Heritage Commission's entrance into the "Amherst Beyond the Commons" video. The recorded footage of the video was done by Kristan Patenaude and Joe Cummings.

After introductions, the tour was handed off to James and Mary Gage. Prior to heading up the trail to the first quarry site, the Gages gave a short demonstration of some of the tools and techniques used in quarrying granite. After the demonstrations, the Gages guided the group to three quarry sites and pointed out the unique features of all. The first site was where the quarry shed originally was, with its remaining foundations and tool setup areas still able to be seen. Guide wires can still be found with appropriate anchoring stays. Quarry#2 was a much smaller quarry pit. The pit is currently filled with water. Quarry#3 was the most interesting. It was marked by a sign from the Amherst Conservation Commission. At this location, you could see evidence of a crane, with guide wires, and the remains of a piston driven compressor from Ingersoll-Sergeant Drill Company of New York. Many discarded granite slabs were noted and this pit was also filled with water.

The tour concluded with a roundtable of final questions for the Gages. A round of thanks was given for their efforts and for the much appreciated information of the Patch Hill Quarries. On the way to the parking kiosk, there were some possible ideas discussed for
